14-October-2008 Voter Registration Deadline. Last day to register to vote before the 4 November 2008 General Election. Voter registration reopens Nov 17.

15-October-2008 Absentee Ballots Mailed Out. Absentee Ballots are mailed out about 3 weeks before the election. Visit the Maryland State Board of Elections for more information about absentee ballots.

28-October-2008 Deadline to Mail an Application for Absentee Ballot. This is the last day to mail in an application for an Absentee Ballot. For information about absentee ballots, visit the MD State Board of Elections. You can download the application. After October 28, you can still request an absentee ballot by going IN PERSON to your local Board of Elections.

Goodloe Forms Micro Lending Team

Micro lending refers to the practice of lending small sums of money to poor, but enterprising, people in order to assist them in working their way out of poverty. These are people who are the salt of the Earth, but are shunned by traditional banking system. Their need is a social justice issue. Micro lending has achieved a great deal of success around the world, especially in assisting women to help improve the lives of their families, as well as themselves.

The purposes of the Goodloe team are to assist poor people who are trying to help themselves as entrepreneurs via the micro lending process; and to build the Goodloe community with an activity which many of our members are likely to support and participate in, at least to a small degree (the minimum loan is only \$25). Team participation can also be a family activity, a religious education project, etc., and it might also stimulate a little friendly competition with other UU congregations, while directly assisting the poor.

Passing (thoughts on) Water by Laird Towle

Recently I collected a small bottle of water from the rain gauges in my vegetable garden. The bottle is a little old antique medicine bottle from my wife's bottle collection, and doesn't hold a lot. But it got me to thinking about how many molecules it contained, and where they may have been.

I have a first cousin who was an atmospheric scientist at the University of Rhode Island. She told me that if she released a marker gas into the atmosphere in Rhode Island, within a week traces of it could be found in the atmosphere all around the Earth. Our atmosphere is very well mixed, so the water molecules in my sample of rain may have also traveled far and wide.

Even my small bottle of water contains an awful lot of molecules. I'm sure you remember Avogadro's Number from high school chemistry. It is the number of molecules of a substance in a gram molecular weight of the material, i.e., 6.02×10^{23} molecules. My water sample is about a mole, so it must contain about that many molecules. That is a 1 followed by 23 zeroes and is a really big number. To put it in perspective, there are about six billion people on Earth at the present time. That is 6×10^9 people, so if we divided this water equally amongst them, each person would get 1014 molecules!

On Earth, water follows a hydraulic cycle from the ground or ocean or river into the atmosphere and back again as precipitation. While in the atmosphere it travels rapidly around the Earth and is thoroughly mixed. The water drops which fell into my rain gauges had probably just come together recently, and each individual molecule has had its own unique history.

My little bottle contains water molecules that have been on the Earth for billions of years, since our atmosphere first formed. Some of these molecules may have arrived relatively recently on meteorites, some may have been trapped for millennia deep inside glaciers or far underground, but most have almost certainly been wandering the atmosphere for eons. They have been to the North Pole, the South Pole, and everywhere in between. They have fallen as rain or snow on all the continents, indeed, most of them have probably been nearly everywhere on Earth.

Surely, water is one of the most well-traveled substances on Earth!

A great deal of water is also tied up in the bodies of living creatures. You will recall that 90%

or more of the matter in our bodies is water, so my body contains a great deal more water than is in my little bottle. And it isn't stagnant either, it is continually recycled. Much of the matter in our bodies is replaced every year; even our most durable cells are replaced about every seven years. I can assure you that in my long life a lot of water molecules have passed through me!

Thus, in addition to having traveled the world, this little bottle of water contains molecules which have been part of billions of people and other creatures of all sorts over the eons. And by the same token, the water currently in my body has obviously been part of much of mankind and all living things before it came to become a temporary part of me.

This illustrates the fact that we are our environment, and our environment is part of us. We are part of all life, and all life is quite literally a part of us. As our seventh principle suggests, we can do no less than "respect the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part."

GOODLOE Board Meeting Minutes - August 5, 2008

Present: Cyn Snavelly, Roger Davidson, Jackie Lord, John Cole, Hazel Elbert, Ken Shilling, & Laird Towle.

Guests: Dick Morris, Lorraine Webb, and Dick Wobus (all left after the discussion re the Choir Director).

1) The meeting was called to order about 7:35 pm with the lighting of the chalice and a reading by Rev. Cyn.

2) The minutes of the July Meeting were approved.

3) The Choir Director Search Committee's recommendation that Dick Wobus be appointed an interim Choir Director for the balance of this fiscal year as an independent contractor was approved. His fee is to be \$2500, and Goodloe is to pay \$60 for a membership in the UU Musician Network and provide up to \$200 for music purchases. The excess funds in the budget are to be returned to the general funds. The Board also asked the Choir Director Search Committee to continue its search for a permanent Choir Director to take office next July. That means the Board would need to sign a contract with the next Choir Director about May of 2009, so the search needs to be initiated well before that.

4) The Religious Education Committee presented a written budget and program outline for the balance of this fiscal year. No committee members were present, but Dawn the RE Consultant, answered some questions via speaker phone (from an undisclosed vacation location!) The program consists of two parts: a) the RE Consultant, a Summer RE Intern, and several volunteers, as previously approved by the Board for July and August; b) the RE Consultant, an RE Coordinator, one RE Teacher, and one Nursery Care Provider, all paid as independent contractors, except for the RE Coordinator who will be a salaried staff person. Several volunteers will also be required. The details of the planned expenses and times are shown below:

RE Consultant, May - Aug \$900 already approved
Summer RE Intern, May - Aug \$540 already approved

Supplies/Training \$500

Professional Expenses \$866 conferences & memberships

RE Consultant, Sep - June \$780 39 wks @ 1 hr/wk @ \$20/hr

RE Coordinator, Sep - June \$4680 39 wks @ 10

hr/wk @ \$12/hr
RE Teacher, Sep - June \$870 29 wks @ 3
hrs/wk @ \$10/hr
Nursery Care Prov., Sep - June \$780 39 wks @
2 hrs/wk @ \$10/hr
Total Expense = \$9916 Approved
Budget = \$10,600

The Board approved the proposed plan, staffing and funding with the following stipulations: a) the excess funds are to be returned to the general funds, b) the RE Search Committee and the RE Consultant are to jointly conduct the staff searches, c) the Board must approve all selections before contracts are signed, and d) the RE Committee is to submit written monthly reports to the Board on the progress of the program.

5) The Financial Officer and the President are to inform each committee chair of their budget allocation so that no one accidentally spends more than allocated without prior approval by the Board.

6) The Minister presented the following ideas for consideration as a result of her week of leadership training:

a) Asked to share by multicultural antiracism lens to write paragraph of what will be said of Goodloe in 5 years- I wrote this in the hopes that our annual Goodloe celebration would be our starting place: "That little congregation really helped bring the university and the town together. The University President and the Mayor were on board and had a lot to do with it, but the people of Goodloe really rallied the people around being a community of town and gown undivided. There wouldn't be as many people at campus events and there wouldn't be as much evidence of the University in the town except for them."

b) Our growth presenters shared that little congregations need a more focused vision than large ones who can fulfill a broad view. I thought of Denise's comment that we are a "jazz church" and of how long you have had a choir. I think music is very important to who Goodloe is.

c) We keep looking at our committee holes and looking for people, and it struck me that we should perhaps look at our people and see if their talents are being well-used.

d) The JPD Healthy Congregations program might be useful to us as we continue to work on process. The program is 5 Saturdays over 5 months, but our DE can also come in and give a short version.

e) We may want to consider doing an RE

assessment. We might consider paying our consultant for 8 hours to contact people and do this. We have 11 parents of children 5 and under now, 6 of whom are new. It is important to bring the RE program up to par.

7) Goals for the year were discussed briefly, but no action taken.

8) The President requested that we undertake a detailed review of the Goodloe committee structure in order to: a) make sure that it fits our needs, b) can be understood by our members, and c) that all necessary tasks are being carried out. He presented a matrix showing a tentative organizational chart depicting all the existing committees and tasks, and the people currently holding/doing them. A lengthy discussion ensued. In order to facilitate further discussion at the next Board meeting, each Trustee was assigned a major heading from the president's chart, and asked to focus on it and the subcommittees listed under it with reference to the objectives indicated above. The category assignments were as follows: Worship - Cyn, RE - Ken, Facilities - Roger, Finances - Roger, Membership - John, Congregational Wellbeing - Laird, Communications - Jackie, Community Outreach - Hazel.

9) Some major items for our calendar for the coming year were discussed briefly. It was decided that;

a) a special collection for the Goodloe Scholarship Fund will be held in September.

b) a congregational meeting will be held in mid-October in order to review the budget and our committee structure, and to appeal for additional volunteers.

The meeting adjourned about 9:50 pm.
